Prayer Requests from 2-IA AOR:

- Stability operations depend upon good cooperation between civilian and military authorities. Ask God that good relations and cooperation develop between civilian and military leaders.
- Poorly operating services like garbage collection and power distribution constrain economic development and make people susceptible to anti-government agendas. Ask God that civic leaders can become true civil servants in providing for the needs of citizens.
- Small transition teams of Americans are advising Iraqi military leaders who are often embarrassed to be perceived as taking advice from the foreigners. Ask that God will give these teams and their counterparts grace to accept and learn from one another.

Luke 4:18-19

Devotional Thought on Luke 4:14-30

Initially, the people of his village praised Jesus when he told them that he was fulfilling their Messianic expectations. Then, when he told his "homeys" that his work included outreach to Syrians and Phoenicians, they tried to kill him. America's vision for democracy in Iraq threatens engrained ethnic identities with a transcendent national one. Jesus' vision for his Messianic kingdom included Romans, Greeks, Syrians, Phoenicians and others who had overrun the Galilee region. His own hometown tried to kill him for desiring this kind of kingdom. America's vision includes economic and political access that is equal for all – Kurds, Shia Arabs, Sunni Arabs, Turkomen, Chaldeans, Assyrians and others. Resistant Iraqis are killing their own while soldiers pay an archetypal sacrificial price.
